**Textbook:** The text is James Stewart's Multivariable Calculus Early Transcendentals, ninth edition, Cengage Learning. Note: earlier editions of this text differ in some sections and most exercises.

**Objectives:** In Math 2310 we study the vector geometry of 3 dimensions, scalar and vector functions of 1, 2 and 3 variables, partial derivatives, directional derivatives, multiple integrals, cylindrical and spherical coordinates, parameterized curves and surfaces, gradient, divergence, curl, line and surface integrals, and the theorems of Gauss, Green, and Stokes. The contents will cover Chapters 12–16 of the textbook.

Students are advised that this course moves very quickly. It is very important to stay abreast of the current topics so as not to fall behind. Also note that while the material at the beginning of the course is comparatively elementary, the later topics will be entirely novel and require substantial effort to master

**Prerequisites:** Cal I, II or equivalent courses.

Grading Policy: Homework (25%), Quizzes (20%), Midterms (30%), Final (25%).

There will be 12 quizzes in total that will be given in class on almost every Thursday. The precise dates for quizzes can be found on Canvas. Two lowest quizzes will be dropped for final grade.

There will be homeworks from WebAssign and written homeworks. The **class key** for signing up WebAssign will be given at the beginning of the semester. The written Homeworks consist of problems from WebAssign (but with possibly different numbers) which should be submitted to GradeScope. Typically, there will be 3-5 written problems for every week. Two lowest written homeworks will be dropped for final grade.

Your final grade will be based on weekly assignments, quizzes, two midterm exams and a final exam. We will slightly de-emphasize counting homeworks towards your final grade, since this is the place you are allowed to make mistakes, and get them clarified.
